Update on Maryland Environmental Legislation

Thank you to those of you who have written to your senators and delegates to support our environmental legislation priorities. We have some encouraging news! See updates on these bills, as of March 18, 2024 (source: Legiscan.com).

Advocate for Environmental Justice! (HB 24 / SB 96)	The House version of the bill (HB24) passed on March 18 to the Senate's Education, Energy and the Environment Committee for consideration. No updates on the Senate version of the bill.
Protect Maryland's Watersheds! (HB 1165 / SB 969)	The House version of the bill (HB1165) passed on March 18 to the Senate's Education, Energy and the Environment Committee for consideration. The Senate version of the bill (SB969) passed on its third reading, 44-0, and will pass to the House for review.
Maryland Needs a Bottle Bill! (HB 735 / SB 642)	The House version of this bill (HB735) remains in its Environment and Transportation Committee since February 7. The Senate version (SB642) remains in its Education, Energy and the Environment Committee since February 9.

Samaritan Ministry of Greater Washington

SMGW was founded in 1986 by twelve Episcopal parishes, of which St. Luke's Bethesda was one. SMGW is a community partnership of over 50 Episcopal and Lutheran parishes and schools in the Greater Washington DC Metropolitan Area that brings together our neighbors

who face poverty, homelessness or other debilitating challenges with partner leaders, donors, volunteers and staff in a shared ministry that improves the lives of all, one next step and neighbor at a time.

The mission of SMGW is (i) to empower its participants to develop capabilities and address barriers they face in order to live sustainable purpose-driven lives, guiding them to set goals, and take "next steps" to meet those goals; (ii) engage its partners to share in this ministry by offering their time, talent and treasure, cultivating relationships that nurture both their missions of community outreach and the mission of the Samaritan Partnership as a whole; and (iii) Identify the basic, systemic and unmet needs of our community that underlie poverty—and engage in organized, collective education and action to address those needs.

There are many ways to support the work of SMGW. First, you are always welcome to donate cash, either directly online or through your participation in any of the SMGW donor events including the Next Step Breakfast, which will be held this year on Saturday April 6 from 9:00 am to 10:30 am at the National Press Club, or the annual Gala which is generally held in the fall. Easter Offering - Emergency Aid to Sudan/South Sudan

Last week, the United Nations' World Food Programme (WFP) warned that the ongoing civil war across Sudan & South Sudan threatens to trigger "the world's largest hunger crisis," with more than 25 million people facing significant food

insecurity & displacement. The WFP is on the ground but lacks sufficient international funding & resources, & the fighting shows no sign of abating.

Given this dire situation, the St. Luke's Community Engagement Committee has designated the World Food Program-USA, WFP's American fundraising arm, as the recipient of this year's Easter offering. Helping to address this global hunger crisis is particularly relevant during the current Basic Needs Cluster period.
